1 Preliminary Remarks

Under the Act on the Federal Office for Information Security (BSIG), the Federal Office for Information Security (BSI) has the task of issuing certificates for information technology products as well as for Protection Profiles (PP).

A PP defines an implementation-independent set of IT security requirements for a category of products which are intended to meet common consumer needs for IT security. A PP claimed by a user, consumer or stakeholder for IT gives them the possibility to express their IT security needs without referring to a specific product. Product certifications can be based on Protection Profiles. For products which have been certified based on a Protection Profile an individual certificate will be issued but the results from a PP certification can be re-used for the Security Target evaluation within a product evaluation when conformance to the PP has been claimed.

Certification of the Protection Profile is carried out on the instigation of the BSI or a sponsor. A part of the procedure is the technical examination (evaluation) of the Protection Profile according to Common Criteria [1]. The evaluation is usually carried out by an evaluation facility recognised by the BSI or by BSI itself. The result of the certification procedure is the present Certification Report. This report contains among others the certificate (summarised assessment) and the detailed certification results.

2 Specifications of the Certification Procedure

The certification body conducts the procedure according to the criteria laid down in the following:

3 Recognition Agreements

In order to avoid multiple certifications of the same Protection Profile in different countries a mutual recognition of IT security certificates - as far as such certificates are based on CC - under certain conditions was agreed. Therefore, the results of this evaluation and certification procedure can be re-used by the product certificate issuing scheme in the evaluation of a Security Target within a subsequent product evaluation and certification procedure.

3.1 European Recognition of CC – Certificates (SOGIS-MRA)

The SOGIS-Mutual Recognition Agreement (SOGIS-MRA) Version 3 became effective in April 2010. It defines the recognition of certificates for IT-Products at a basic recognition level up to and including Common Criteria (CC) Evaluation Assurance Levels EAL 4, and in addition at higher recognition levels for IT-Products related to certain technical domains only. In addition, certificates issued for Protection Profiles based on Common Criteria are part of the recognition agreement.

The SOGIS-MRA logo printed on the certificate indicates that it is recognised under the terms of this agreement by the related bodies of the signatory nations. When indicated, a disclaimer beneath the logo indicates the specific scope of recognition.

3.2 International Recognition of CC – Certificates (CCRA)

The international Common Criteria Recognition Arrangement (CCRA) became effictive in September 2014 in its current version. It defines the recognition of certificates for IT-products based on collaborative Protection Profiles (cPP) (exact use), CC certificates based on assurance components up to and including EAL 2 or the assurance family Flaw Remediation (ALC_FLR), CC certificates for Protection Profiles and for collaborative Protection Profiles.

The Common Criteria Recognition Arrangement logo printed on the certificate indicates that this certification is recognised under the terms of this agreement by the related bodies of the signatory nations. When indicated, a disclaimer beneath the logo indicates the specific scope of recognition.

4 Performance of Evaluation and Certification

The certification body monitors each individual evaluation to ensure a uniform procedure, a uniform interpretation of the criteria and uniform ratings.

The Biometric Mechanisms Protection Profile (BMPP), Version 2.0 has undergone the certification procedure at BSI.

The evaluation of the Biometric Mechanisms Protection Profile (BMPP), Version 2.0 was conducted by the ITSEF TÜV Informationstechnik GmbH. The evaluation was completed on 14 February 2022. The ITSEF TÜV Informationstechnik GmbH is an evaluation facility (ITSEF)⁵ recognised by the certification body of BSI.

For this certification procedure the sponsor and applicant is: Federal Office for Information Security.

The PP was developed by the Federal Office for Information Security with support of the company "konfidas GmbH".

The certification is concluded with the comparability check and the production of this Certification Report. This work was completed by the BSI.

5 Validity of the certification result

This Certification Report only applies to the version of the Protection Profile as indicated.

In case of changes to the certified version of the Protection Profile, the validity can be extended to new versions and releases, provided the sponsor applies for assurance continuity (i.e. re-certification or maintenance) of the modified Protection Profile, in accordance with the procedural requirements, and the evaluation does not reveal any security deficiencies.

For the meaning of the CC concepts and terms please refer to CC [1] Part 1 for the concept of PPs, to CC [1] Part 2 for the definition of Security Functional Requirements components (SFR) and to CC [1] Part 3 for the definition of the Security Assurance Components, for the class AVA – Vulnerability assessment and for the cross reference of Evaluation Assurance Levels (EALs) and assurance components.

The validity of this certificate ends as outlined on the certificate. The applicant and the sponsor of this certificate are recommended to review the technical content of the Protection Profile certified according to the evolvement of the technology and of the intended operational environment of the type of product concerned as well as according to the evolvement of the evaluation criteria. Such review should result in an update and a recertification of the Protection Profile accordingly.

The limitation of validity of this PP certificate does not necessarily impact the validity period of a product certificate referring to this Protection Profile, but the certification body issuing a product certificate based on this Protection Profile should take it into its consideration on validity.

6 Publication

B Certification Results

The following results represent a summary of

- the certified Protection Profile,
- the relevant evaluation results from the evaluation facility, and
- complementary notes and stipulations of the certification body.

1 Protection Profile Overview

The Biometric Mechanisms Protection Profile (BMPP), Version 2.0 [6] is established by the Federal Office of Information Security as a basis for the development of Security Targets in order to perform a certification of an IT-product, the Target of Evaluation (TOE). The Biometric Mechanisms Protection Profile (BMPP), Version 2.0 from October, 8th 2021 describes as a TOE type a biometric system. The PP has a modular structure and it specifies a base PP as well as four additional functional packages. The TOE, depending on the base PP and at least one functional package, shall provide biometric verification and/or functionality for Presentation Attack Detection (PAD). In augmentation to one of these functionalities, the TOE may provide the functionality for identification and authentication of administrators and/or the functionality for protection of the enrollment process. The allowed combinations for the base PP and the functional packages can be found in the PP [6], chapter 8.1.

The assets to be protected by a TOE claiming conformance to this PP are defined in the Protection Profile [6], chapter 4.2. Based on these assets the security problem definition is defined in terms of assumptions, threats and organisational security policies. This is outlined in the Protection Profile [6], chapters 4.3, 4.4 and 4.5. Due to the modular structure of the PP, the security problem definition can be changed based on the selected functional package(s) to be used in addition to the base PP. Each functional package introduces specific changes or additions to the assumptions, threats and the organisational security policies. This is outlined in the following chapters:

- 8.2.3 (Functional Package: Biometric Verification)
- 8.3.3 (Functional Package: PAD)
- 8.4.3 (Functional Package: Identification and Authentication for administrators)
- 8.5.3 (Functional Package: Enrolment Protection)

These assumptions, threats and organisational security policies are split into security objectives to be fulfilled by a TOE claiming conformance to this PP and security objectives to be fulfilled by its operational environment. The objectives for the base PP are outlined in the PP [6], chapters 5.1 and 5.2. In addition, based on the functional package(s) selected in conjunction with the base PP, the security objectives for the TOE and the operational environment can be modified. This is outlined in the following chapters:

- 8.2.4 and 8.2.5 (Functional Package: Biometric Verification)
- 8.3.4 and 8.3.5 (Functional Package: PAD)
- 8.4.4 and 8.4.5 (Functional Package: Identification and Authentication for administrators)
- 8.5.4 and 8.5.5 (Functional Package: Enrolment Protection)

The Protection Profile [6] requires a Security Target based on this PP or another PP claiming this PP to fulfill the CC requirements for demonstrable conformance.

2 Security Functional Requirements

Based on the security objectives to be fulfilled by a TOE claiming conformance to this PP the security policy is expressed by the set of security functional requirements (SFR) to be implemented by a TOE. It covers the following issues for the base PP: Security Audit, User Data Protection and Security Management.

Considering the modular structure of the PP, each functional package introduces additional SFRs which cover the following aspects: Biometric Verification, Presentation Attack Detection, Identification and Authentication for administrators and Enrollment Protection.

The TOE security functional requirements for the base PP are outlined in the PP [6], chapter 7.1. For each functional package, additional SFRs are defined and they are outlined in chapters 8.2.7, 8.3.7, 8.4.7 and 8.5.7. They are selected from Common Criteria Part 2 and some of them are newly defined. Thus the SFR claim is called:

Common Criteria Part 2 extended

3 Assurance Requirements

The TOE security assurance package claimed in the Protection Profile is based entirely on the assurance components defined in part 3 of the Common Criteria. Thus, this assurance package is called:

Common Criteria Part 3 conformant

The explicit assurance package is based on EAL 2 and consists of the following Assurance Components:

In contrast to EAL 2, the explicit assurance package does not contain AVA_VAN.2 but is augmented by ALC_FLR.1.

This explicit assurance level allows a purely functional evaluation. Such an evaluation will allow to determine whether the functionality of a biometric system is sufficient to with respect to the defined security functional requirements.

4 Results of the PP-Evaluation

The Evaluation Technical Report (ETR) [7] was provided by the ITSEF according to the Common Criteria [1], the Methodology [2], the requirements of the Scheme [3] and all Application Notes and Interpretations of the Scheme (AIS) [4] as relevant for the TOE.

As a result of the evaluation the verdict PASS is confirmed for the assurance components of the class APE (Protection Profile evaluation).

The following assurance components were used:

The results of the evaluation are only applicable to the Protection Profile as defined in chapter 1.

5 Obligations and notes for the usage

The following aspects need to be fulfilled when using the Protection Profile:

 The Protection Profile contains application notes, the author of a product specific Security Target needs to consider when creating a Security Target and implementing a TOE that claims conformance to this PP.

• In addition, a biometric system conformant to this PP could be realized in two major configurations: as an integrated solution (all relevant parts of the TOE are integrated into one physical unit) or as a distributed solution (relevant parts of the TOE are implemented in physically separated parts). For further information, please refer to the PP, chapter 2.7.

7.2 Glossary

Augmentation - The addition of one or more requirement(s) to a package.

Extension - The addition to an ST or PP of functional requirements not contained in part 2 and/or assurance requirements not contained in part 3 of the CC.

Formal - Expressed in a restricted syntax language with defined semantics based on well-established mathematical concepts.

Informal - Expressed in natural language.

Object - A passive entity in the TOE, that contains or receives information, and upon which subjects perform operations.

Protection Profile - An implementation-independent statement of security needs for a TOE type.

Security Target - An implementation-dependent statement of security needs for a specific identified TOE.

Semiformal - Expressed in a restricted syntax language with defined semantics.

Subject - An active entity in the TOE that performs operations on objects.

Target of Evaluation - A set of software, firmware and/or hardware possibly accompanied by guidance.

TOE Security Functionality - Combined functionality of all hardware, software, and firmware of a TOE that must be relied upon for the correct enforcement of the SFRs.
