#### 1.3. TOE Overview

The Target of Evaluation (TOE) is the contactless integrated circuit chip of machine readable travel documents (MRTD's chip) programmed according to the Logical Data Structure (LDS) [5] and providing the Basic Access Control and Extended Access Control according to the 'ICAO Doc 9303' [ICAO] and BSI TR-03110 [TR-03], respectively.

The TOE is composed of:

- the NXP J3A081 Revision 3 Secure Smartcard Controller (named JCOP v2.4.1), comprising of
  - the circuitry of the MRTD's chip (the integrated circuit, IC NXP Secure Smart Card Controllers P5CD081V1A).
  - the IC Embedded Software (operating system): JCOP v2.4.1 Revision 3,
- the MRTD application: ePassport Applet that is compliant with [ICAO] and [TR-03].
- the associated guidance documentation.

JCOP 2.4.1 R3 is based on Java Card 2.2.2 and Global Platform 2.1.1 industry standards. It implements high security mechanisms and supports:

Communication protocols that the TOE uses: T=CL (contact-less)

Cryptographic algorithms and functionality that the TOE uses:

- 3DES
- RSA
- SHA-1, SHA-224, SHA-256
- ECC over GF(p)



Random number generation

It provides the security level of EAL4 augmented with ALC\_DVS.2 and AVA\_VAN.5.

The TOE type of the current security target is "the contactless integrated circuit chip of machine readable travel documents (MRTD's chip) programmed according to the Logical Data Structure (LDS) and providing the Basic Access Control and Extended Access Control", compatible with the expected TOE type described in the PP.

#### TOE usage and security features for operational use:

A State or Organization issues MRTD to be used by the holder for international travel. The traveller presents a MRTD to the inspection system to prove his or her identity. The MRTD in context of this security target contains (i) visual (eye readable) biographical data and portrait of the holder, (ii) a separate data summary (MRZ data) for visual and machine reading using OCR methods in the Machine readable zone (MRZ) and (iii) data elements on the MRTD's chip according to LDS for contactless machine reading. The authentication of the traveller is based on (i) the possession of a valid MRTD personalized for a holder with the claimed identity as given on the biographical data page and (ii) optional biometrics using the reference data stored in the MRTD. The issuing State or Organization ensures the authenticity of the data of genuine MRTD's. The receiving State trusts a genuine MRTD of an issuing State or Organization.



# 2. TOE Description

The Target of Evaluation (TOE) is the contactless integrated circuit chip of machine readable travel documents (MRTD's chip) programmed according to the Logical Data Structure (LDS) and providing the Basic Access Control and Extended Access Control according to 'ICAO Doc 9303' [ICAO] and BSI TR-03110 [TR-03], respectively.

The TOE comprises of:

- the circuitry of the MRTD's chip (the integrated circuit, IC NXP Secure Smart Card controllers P5CD081V1A)
- An Operating System named JCOP 2.4.1 Revision 3, based on Java Card and Global Platform technology. It's main responsibilities are:
  - To perform contents management of the card and security monitor of the card.
  - To provide interfaces defined in [JCAPI], [GP] and its proprietary guidance between the Integrated Circuit and the ePassport Applet.
  - To provide services for memory access and all cryptographic operations.
- The ePassport Applet that is compliant with [ICAO] and [TR-03].
- the associated guidance documentation/

The loading mechanism defined in JavaCard and GlobalPlatform specifications is blocked. Therefore, no applet loading is allowed.

#### Physical and logical scope of the TOE:

For this security target the MRTD is viewed as unit of:

- 1) the **physical MRTD** as travel document in form of paper, plastic and chip. It presents visual readable data including (but not limited to) personal data of the MRTD holder:
  - a. the biographical data on the biographical data page of the passport book,
  - b. the printed data in the Machine-Readable Zone (MRZ) and
  - c. the printed portrait.
- 2) The logical MRTD as data of the MRTD holder stored according to the Logical Data Structure [ICAO] as specified by ICAO on the contactless integrated circuit. It presents contactless readable data including (but not limited to) personal data of the MRTD holder:
  - a. the digital Machine Readable Zone Data (digital MRZ data, EF.DG1),
  - b. the digitized portraits (EF.DG2),
  - c. the optional biometric reference data of finger(s) (EF.DG3) or iris image(s) (EF.DG4) or both1
  - d. the other data according to LDS (EF.DG5 to EF.DG16) and
  - e. the Document security object.

The issuing State or Organization implements security features of the MRTD to maintain the authenticity and integrity of the MRTD and their data. The MRTD as the passport book and the MRTD's chip is uniquely identified by the Document Number.

The physical MRTD is protected by physical security measures (e.g. watermark on paper, security printing), logical (e.g. authentication keys of the MRTD's chip) and organizational



security measures (e.g. control of materials, personalization procedures) [ICAO]. These security measures include the binding of the MRTD's chip to the passport book.

The logical MRTD is protected in authenticity and integrity by a digital signature created by the document signer acting for the issuing State or Organization and the security features of the MRTD's chip.

The ICAO defines the baseline security methods Passive Authentication and the optional advanced security methods Basic Access Control to the logical MRTD, Active Authentication of the MRTD's chip, Extended Access Control to and the Data Encryption of additional sensitive biometrics as optional security measure in the 'ICAO Doc 9303' [ICAO]. The Passive Authentication Mechanism and the Data Encryption are performed completely and independently on the TOE by the TOE environment.

This security target addresses the protection of the logical MRTD (i) in integrity by write-only-once access control and by physical means, and (ii) in confidentiality by the Extended Access Control Mechanism. This security target addresses the Chip Authentication described in [TR-03] as an alternative to the Active Authentication stated in [ICAO].

The confidentiality by Basic Access Control is a mandatory security feature that shall be implemented by the TOE, too. Nevertheless this is not explicitly covered by this security target as there are known weaknesses in the quality (i.e. entropy) of the BAC keys generated by the environment. Therefore, the MRTD has additionally to fulfil the 'Common Criteria Protection Profile Machine Readable Travel Document with "ICAO Application", Basic Access Control' [PPBAC]. Due to the fact that [PPBAC] does only consider extended basic attack potential to the Basic Access Control Mechanism (i.e. AVA\_VAN.3) the MRTD has to be evaluated and certified separately. The evaluation and certification process might have taken place in advance or could – more likely –be carried out simultaneously to the current process according the PP in hand.

For BAC, the inspection system (i) reads optically the MRTD, (ii) authenticates itself as inspection system by means of Document Basic Access Keys. After successful authentication of the inspection system the MRTD's chip provides read access to the logical MRTD by means of private communication (secure messaging) with this inspection system [ICAO], normative appendix 5.

The security target requires the TOE to implement the Chip Authentication defined in [TR-03]. The Chip Authentication prevents data traces described in [ICAO], informative appendix 7, A7.3.3. The Chip Authentication is provided by the following steps: (i) the inspection system communicates by means of secure messaging established by Basic Access Control, (ii) the inspection system reads and verifies by means of the Passive Authentication the authenticity of the MRTD's Chip Authentication Public Key using the Document Security Object, (iii) the inspection system generates an ephemeral key pair, (iv) the TOE and the inspection system agree on two session keys for secure messaging in ENC\_MAC mode according to the Diffie-Hellman Primitive and (v) the inspection system verifies by means of received message authentication codes whether the MRTD's chip was able or not to run this protocol properly (i.e. the TOE proves to be in possession of the Chip Authentication Private Key corresponding to the Chip Authentication Public Key used for derivation of the session keys). The Chip Authentication requires collaboration of the TOE and the TOE environment.



The security target requires the TOE to implement the Extended Access Control as defined in [TR-03]. The Extended Access Control consists of two parts (i) the Chip Authentication Protocol and (ii) the Terminal Authentication Protocol. The Chip Authentication Protocol (i) authenticates the MRTD's chip to the inspection system and (ii) establishes secure messaging, which is used by Terminal Authentication to protect the confidentiality and integrity of the sensitive biometric reference data during their transmission from the TOE to the inspection system. Therefore Terminal Authentication can only be performed if Chip Authentication has been successfully executed. The Terminal Authentication Protocol consists of (i) the authentication of the inspection system as entity authorized by the receiving State or Organization through the issuing State, and (ii) an access control by the TOE to allow reading the sensitive biometric reference data only to successfully authenticated authorized inspection systems. The issuing State or Organization authorizes the receiving State by means of certification the authentication public keys of Document Verifiers who create Inspection System Certificates.

#### **TOE life cycle:**

The TOE life cycle is described in terms of the four life cycle phases. (With respect to the [IC], the TOE life-cycle the life-cycle is additionally subdivided into 7 steps.)

# Phase 1 "Development"

(Step1) The TOE is developed in phase 1. The IC developer develops the integrated circuit, the IC Dedicated Software and the guidance documentation associated with these TOE components.

(Step2) The software developer uses the guidance documentation for the integrated circuit and the guidance documentation for relevant parts of the IC Dedicated Software and develops the IC Embedded Software (operating system), the MRTD application and the guidance documentation associated with these TOE components.

The manufacturing documentation of the IC including the IC Dedicated Software and the Embedded Software in the non-volatile non-programmable memories (ROM) is securely delivered to the IC manufacturer. The IC Embedded Software in the non-volatile programmable memories, the MRTD application and the guidance documentation is securely delivered to the MRTD manufacturer.

#### Phase 2 "Manufacturing"

(Step3) In a first step the TOE integrated circuit is produced containing the MRTD's chip Dedicated Software and the parts of the MRTD's chip Embedded Software in the non-volatile non-programmable memories (ROM). The IC manufacturer writes the IC Identification Data onto the chip to control the IC as MRTD material during the IC manufacturing and the delivery process to the MRTD manufacturer. The IC is securely delivered from the IC manufacture to the MRTD manufacturer.

If necessary the IC manufacturer adds the parts of the IC Embedded Software in the non-volatile programmable memories (for instance EEPROM).

(Step4) The MRTD manufacturer combines the IC with hardware for the contactless



interface in the passport book.

(Step5) The MRTD manufacturer (i) creates the MRTD application and (ii) equips MRTD's chips with pre-personalization Data.

The pre-personalized MRTD together with the IC Identifier is securely delivered from the MRTD manufacturer to the Personalization Agent. The MRTD manufacturer also provides the relevant parts of the guidance documentation to the Personalization Agent.

#### Phase 3 "Personalization of the MRTD"

(Step6) The personalization of the MRTD includes (i) the survey of the MRTD holder's biographical data, (ii) the enrolment of the MRTD holder biometric reference data (i.e. the digitized portraits and the optional biometric reference data), (iii) the printing of the visual readable data onto the physical MRTD, (iv) the writing of the TOE User Data and TSF Data into the logical MRTD and (v) configuration of the TSF if necessary. The step (iv) is performed by the Personalization Agent and includes but is not limited to the creation of (i) the digital MRZ data (EF.DG1), (ii) the digitized portrait (EF.DG2), and (iii) the Document security object.

The signing of the Document security object by the Document Signer [ICAO] finalizes the personalization of the genuine MRTD for the MRTD holder. The personalized MRTD (together with appropriate guidance for TOE use if necessary) is handed over to the MRTD holder for operational use.

#### Phase 4 "Operational Use"


(Step7) The TOE is used as MRTD chip by the traveller and the inspection systems in the "Operational Use" phase. The user data can be read according to the security policy of the issuing State or Organization and can be used according to the security policy of the issuing State but they can never be modified.

(See the Protection profile for applicable application notes: 1,2,3,4 and 5)

#### 2.1. TOE Architecture

The TOE is a composition of IC hardware and an embedded software that controls the IC.





The TOE is defined to comprise the chip and the complete operating system and application. Note, the inlay holding the chip as well as the antenna and the booklet (holding the printed MRZ) are needed to represent a complete MRTD, nevertheless these parts are not inevitable for the secure operation of the TOE.



# 3. Conformance Claim

This security target claims the following conformance with Common Criteria:

- Common Criteria for Information Technology Security Evaluation Part 1: Introduction and general model, Version 3.1, Revision 3, July 2009 conformant.
- Common Criteria for Information Technology Security Evaluation Part 2: Security functional components, Version 3.1, Revision 3, July 2009 extended conformance with FAU\_SAS.1, FCS\_RND.1, FIA\_API.1, FMT\_LIM.1, FMT\_LIM.2 and FPT\_EMSEC.1 (defined in the chapter 6. Extended component definition).
- Common Criteria for Information Technology Security Evaluation Part 3: Security assurance components, Version 3.1, Revision 3, July 2009 conformant.

This security target claims the following conformance with protection profiles:

 A strict conformance with Common Criteria Protection Profile Machine Readable Travel Document with "ICAO Application", Extended Access Control version 1.10, 25<sup>th</sup> March 2009.

This security target and the TOE claim conformity with EAL4+, augmented with ALC\_DVS.2 (Sufficiency of security measures) and AVA\_VAN.5 (Advanced methodical vulnerability analysis)

#### 3.1. Conformance Claim rationale

The security target and the TOE are conformant with CC version 3.1 release 3 and the protection profile with CC version 3.1 release 1 for Part 1, and release 2 for Part 2 and Part3. The following statements show the non-incompatibility between both:

- The differences between part 1 of CC version 3.1 in Release 1 and Release 3 are only in definitions and in identification of glossary, therefore it is not relevant
- The differences between part 2 of CC version 3.1 in Release 2 and Release 3 applicable in the definition of some SFR. Some of the are refined for aligning the SFR with the whole definition of the TOE. The following list shows the SFR that suffered changes:
  - FAU\_SAR.1, description of components
  - o FAU SEL.1.1, requirements modification
  - FDP\_ACF.1.4, requirements modification Information flow control functions (FDP IFF), family behaviour
  - o FDP\_UCT.1.1, requirements modification
  - o FDP UIT.1.1, requirements modification



- TSF self test (FPT\_TST), requirements modification because in the PP R2 it applies FPT\_TST.1.3 the requirements applies to TSF executable code, while in R3 it applies TSF or parts of TSF. Our selection covers all the TSF
- The differences between part 3 of CC version 3.1 in Release 2 and Release 3 applicable in the definition of some SAR.
  - o Definition of EAL4 reducing the ATE DPT from 2 to 1
  - Definition of EAL6 level
  - o APE class definitions
  - Refinement of the definition of TSFI meaning
  - o Suppression of ADV\_SPM.1.5C
  - Mandatory providing of the delivery documentation, Development site security, flaw remediation and documentation of tools and techniques
  - Renaming terms of architectural design for security architecture description.
  - Module definition regarding implementation of SFR.

These differences don't affects to the compatibility between TOE conformant with CC v3.1 R3 and PP conformant with CC v3.1 R1 and R2. The difference in the SFR is identified in the current ST.

The TOE type of the current security target is " the contactless integrated circuit chip of machine readable travel documents (MRTD's chip) programmed according to the Logical Data Structure (LDS) and providing the Extended Access Control ", compatible with the expected TOE type described in the PP.



# 4. Security Problem Definition

#### 4.1. Introduction

#### **Assets**

The assets to be protected by the TOE include the User Data on the MRTD's chip.

#### Logical MRTD Data

The logical MRTD data consists of the EF.COM, EF.DG1 to EF.DG16 (with different security needs) and the Document Security Object EF.SOD according to LDS [ICAO]. These data are user data of the TOE. The EF.COM lists the existing elementary files (EF) with the user data. The EF.DG1 to EF.DG13 and EF.DG 16 contain personal data of the MRTD holder. The Chip Authentication Public Key (EF.DG 14) is used by the inspection system for the Chip Authentication. The EF.SOD is used by the inspection system for Passive Authentication of the logical MRTD.

Due to interoperability reasons as the 'ICAO Doc 9303' [ICAO] the TOE described in this security target specifies only the BAC mechanisms with resistance against enhanced basic attack potential granting access to:

- Logical MRTD standard User Data (i.e. Personal Data) of the MRTD holder (EF.DG1, EF.DG2, EF.DG5 to EF.DG13, EF.DG16),
- Chip Authentication Public Key in EF.DG14,
- Active Authentication Public Key in EF.DG15,
- Document Security Object (SOD) in EF.SOD,
- Common data in EF.COM.

The TOE prevents read access to sensitive User Data.

Sensitive biometric reference data (EF.DG3, EF.DG4).

A sensitive asset is the following more general one.

# Authenticity of the MRTD's chip

The authenticity of the MRTD's chip personalized by the issuing State or Organization for the MRTD holder is used by the traveller to prove his possession of a genuine MRTD.

#### Subjects

This security target considers the following subjects:

#### Manufacturer

The generic term for the IC Manufacturer producing the integrated circuit and the MRTD Manufacturer completing the IC to the MRTD's chip. The Manufacturer is the default user of



the TOE during the Phase 2 Manufacturing. The TOE does not distinguish between the users IC Manufacturer and MRTD Manufacturer using this role Manufacturer.

#### **Personalization Agent**

The agent is acting on behalf of the issuing State or Organization to personalize the MRTD for the holder by some or all of the following activities (i) establishing the identity the holder for the biographic data in the MRTD, (ii) enrolling the biometric reference data of the MRTD holder i.e. the portrait, the encoded finger image(s) and/or the encoded iris image(s) (iii) writing these data on the physical and logical MRTD for the holder as defined for global, international and national interoperability, (iv) writing the initial TSF data and (iv) signing the Document Security Object defined in [ICAO].

#### **Country Verifying Certification Authority**

The Country Verifying Certification Authority (CVCA) enforces the privacy policy of the issuing State or Organization with respect to the protection of sensitive biometric reference data stored in the MRTD. The CVCA represents the country specific root of the PKI of Inspection Systems and creates the Document Verifier Certificates within this PKI. The updates of the public key of the CVCA are distributed in the form of Country Verifying CA Link-Certificates.

#### **Document Verifier**

The Document Verifier (DV) enforces the privacy policy of the receiving State with respect to the protection of sensitive biometric reference data to be handled by the Extended Inspection Systems. The Document Verifier manages the authorization of the Extended Inspection Systems for the sensitive data of the MRTD in the limits provided by the issuing States or Organizations in the form of the Document Verifier Certificates.

#### Terminal

A terminal is any technical system communicating with the TOE through the contactless interface.

# Inspection system (IS)

A technical system used by the border control officer of the receiving State (i) examining an MRTD presented by the traveller and verifying its authenticity and (ii) verifying the traveller as MRTD holder. The Basic Inspection System (BIS) (i) contains a terminal for the contactless communication with the MRTD's chip, (ii) implements the terminals part of the Basic Access Control Mechanism and (iii) gets the authorization to read the logical MRTD under the Basic Access Control by optical reading the MRTD or other parts of the passport book providing this information. The General Inspection System (GIS) is a Basic Inspection System which implements additionally the Chip Authentication Mechanism. The Extended Inspection System (EIS) in addition to the General Inspection System (i) implements the Terminal Authentication Protocol and (ii) is authorized by the issuing State or Organization through the Document Verifier of the receiving State to read the sensitive biometric reference data. The security attributes of the EIS are defined of the Inspection System Certificates.

#### **MRTD Holder**

The rightful holder of the MRTD for whom the issuing State or Organization personalized the MRTD.



#### **Traveller**

Person presenting the MRTD to the inspection system and claiming the identity of the MRTD holder.

#### **Attacker**

A threat agent trying (i) to identify and to trace the movement of the MRTD's chip remotely (i.e. without knowing or optically reading the printed MRZ data), (ii) to read or to manipulate the logical MRTD without authorization, or (iii) to forge a genuine MRTD.

#### 4.2. Assumptions

#### 4.2.4. A.Insp\_Sys Inspection Systems for global interoperability

This assumption is included in the ST and it is described in the MRTD, "ICAO Application", Extended Access Control PP (paragraph 63).

#### 4.2.5. A.Signature\_PKI PKI for Passive Authentication

This assumption is included in the ST and it is described in the MRTD, "ICAO Application", Extended Access Control PP (paragraph 64).

#### 4.2.6. A.Auth PKI PKI for Inspection Systems

This assumption is included in the ST and it is described in the MRTD, "ICAO Application", Extended Access Control PP (paragraph 65).

#### 4.3.1. T.Read Sensitive Data Read the sensitive biometric reference data

#### 4.3.5. T.Information\_Leakage Information Leakage from MRTD's chip

#### 4.3.6. T.Phys-Tamper Physical Tampering

# 5. Security Objectives

This chapter describes the security objectives for the TOE and the security objectives for the TOE environment. The security objectives for the TOE environment are separated into security objectives for the development and production environment and security objectives for the operational environment.

The OSP **P. BAC-PP** is directly addressed by the **OE.BAC-PP**.

The OSP **P.Manufact** "Manufacturing of the MRTD's chip" requires a unique identification of the IC by means of the Initialization Data and the writing of the Pre-personalization Data as being fulfilled by **OT.Identification**.

The OSP **P.Personalization** "Personalization of the MRTD by issuing State or Organization only" addresses the (i) the enrolment of the logical MRTD by the Personalization Agent as described in the security objective for the TOE environment **OE.Personalization** "Personalization of logical MRTD", and (ii) the access control for the user data and TSF data as described by the security objective **OT.AC\_Pers** "Access Control for Personalization of logical MRTD". Note the manufacturer equips the TOE with the Personalization Agent Key(s) according to **OT.Identification** "Identification and Authentication of the TOE". The security objective **OT.AC\_Pers** limits the management of TSF data and the management of TSF to the Personalization Agent.

The OSP **P.Sensitive\_Data** "Privacy of sensitive biometric reference data" is fulfilled and the threat **T.Read\_Sensitive\_Data** "Read the sensitive biometric reference data" is countered by the TOE-objective **OT.Sens\_Data\_Conf** "Confidentiality of sensitive biometric reference data" requiring that read access to EF.DG3 and EF.DG4 (containing the sensitive biometric reference data) is only granted to authorized inspection systems. Furthermore it is required that the transmission of these data ensures the data's confidentiality. The authorization bases on Document Verifier certificates issued by the issuing State or Organization as required by **OE.Authoriz\_Sens\_Data** "Authorization for use of sensitive biometric reference data". The Document Verifier of the receiving State has to authorize Extended Inspection Systems by creating appropriate Inspection System certificates for access to the sensitive biometric reference data as demanded by **OE.Ext\_Insp\_Systems** "Authorization of Extended Inspection Systems".

The threat **T.Forgery** "Forgery of data on MRTD's chip" addresses the fraudulent alteration



of the complete stored logical MRTD or any part of it. The security objective **OT.AC\_Pers** "Access Control for Personalization of logical MRTD" requires the TOE to limit the write access for the logical MRTD to the trustworthy Personalization Agent (cf. OE.Personalization). The TOE will protect the integrity of the stored logical MRTD according the security objective **OT.Data\_Int** "Integrity of personal data" and **OT.Prot\_Phys-Tamper** "Protection against Physical Tampering". The examination of the presented MRTD passport book according to **OE.Exam\_MRTD** "Examination of the MRTD passport book" shall ensure that passport book does not contain a sensitive contactless chip which may present the complete unchanged logical MRTD. The TOE environment will detect partly forged logical MRTD data by means of digital signature which will be created according to **OE.Pass\_Auth\_Sign** "Authentication of logical MRTD by Signature" and verified by the inspection system according to **OE.Passive\_Auth\_Verif** "Verification by Passive Authentication".

The threat **T.Counterfeit** "MRTD's chip" addresses the attack of unauthorized copy or reproduction of the genuine MRTD chip. This attack is thwarted by chip an identification and authenticity proof required by **OT.Chip\_Auth\_Proof** "Proof of MRTD's chip authentication" using a authentication key pair to be generated by the issuing State or Organization. The Public Chip Authentication Key has to be written into EF.DG14 and signed by means of Documents Security Objects as demanded by **OE.Auth\_Key\_MRTD** "MRTD Authentication Key". According to **OE.Exam\_MRTD** "Examination of the MRTD passport book" the General Inspection system has to perform the Chip Authentication Protocol to verify the authenticity of the MRTD's chip.

The threat **T.Abuse-Func** "Abuse of Functionality" addresses attacks of misusing MRTD's functionality to disable or bypass the TSFs. The security objective for the TOE **OT.Prot\_Abuse-Func** "Protection against abuse of functionality" ensures that the usage of functions which may not be used in the "Operational Use" phase is effectively prevented. Therefore attacks intending to abuse functionality in order to disclose or manipulate critical (User) Data or to affect the TOE in such a way that security features or TOE's functions may be bypassed, deactivated, changed or explored shall be effectively countered.

The threats **T.Information\_Leakage** "Information Leakage from MRTD's chip", **T.Phys-Tamper** "Physical Tampering" and **T.Malfunction** "Malfunction due to Environmental Stress" are typical for integrated circuits like smart cards under direct attack with high attack potential. The protection of the TOE against these threats is addressed by the directly related security objectives **OT.Prot\_Inf\_Leak** "Protection against Information Leakage", **OT.Prot\_Phys-Tamper** "Protection against Physical Tampering" and **OT.Prot\_Malfunction** "Protection against Malfunctions".

The assumption **A.MRTD\_Manufact** "MRTD manufacturing on step 4 to 6" is covered by the security objective for the TOE environment **OE.MRTD\_Manufact** "Protection of the MRTD Manufacturing" that requires to use security procedures during all manufacturing steps.

The assumption **A.MRTD\_ Delivery** "MRTD delivery during step 4 to 6" is covered by the security objective for the TOE environment **OE.MRTD\_ Delivery** "Protection of the MRTD delivery" that requires to use security procedures during delivery steps of the MRTD.

The assumption A.Pers\_Agent "Personalization of the MRTD's chip" is covered by the



security objective for the TOE environment **OE.Personalization** "Personalization of logical MRTD" including the enrolment, the protection with digital signature and the storage of the MRTD holder personal data.

The examination of the MRTD passport book addressed by the assumption **A.Insp\_Sys** "Inspection Systems for global interoperability" is covered by the security objectives for the TOE environment **OE.Exam\_MRTD** "Examination of the MRTD passport book" which requires the inspection system to examine physically the MRTD, the Basic Inspection System to implement the Basic Access Control, and the General Inspection Systems and Extended Inspection Systems to implement and to perform the Chip Authentication Protocol to verify the Authenticity of the presented MRTD's chip. The security objectives for the TOE environment **OE.Prot\_Logical\_MRTD** "Protection of data from the logical MRTD" require the Inspection System to protect the logical MRTD data during the transmission and the internal handling.

The assumption **A.Signature\_PKI** "PKI for Passive Authentication" is directly covered by the security objective for the TOE environment **OE.Pass\_Auth\_Sign** "Authentication of logical MRTD by Signature" covering the necessary procedures for the Country Signing CA Key Pair and the Document Signer Key Pairs. The implementation of the signature verification procedures is covered by **OE.Exam\_MRTD** "Examination of the MRTD passport book".

The assumption **A.Auth\_PKI** "PKI for Inspection Systems" is covered by the security objective for the TOE environment **OE.Authoriz\_Sens\_Data** "Authorization for use of sensitive biometric reference data" requires the CVCA to limit the read access to sensitive biometrics by issuing Document Verifier certificates for authorized receiving States or Organizations only. The Document Verifier of the receiving State is required by **OE.Ext\_Insp\_Systems** "Authorization of Extended Inspection Systems" to authorize Extended Inspection Systems by creating Inspection System Certificates. Therefore, the receiving issuing State or Organization has to establish the necessary public key infrastructure.

# 7. Security Requirements

The definition of the subjects "Manufacturer", "Personalization Agent", "Basic Inspection System", "General Inspection System", "Extended Inspection System", "Country Verifying Certification Authority", "Document Verifier" and "Terminal" used in the following chapter is given in section 4.1 of this Security Target. Note, that all these subjects are acting for homonymous external entities. All used objects are defined in section 7 from the [PP].

The operations "write", "modify", "read" and "disable read access" are used in accordance with the general linguistic usage. The operations "store", "create", "transmit", "receive", "establish communication channel", "authenticate" and "re-authenticate" are originally taken from Common Criteria 3.1 R3 Part 2. The operation "load" is synonymous to "import" used in Common Criteria 3.1 R3 Part 2.

The traceability table and the coverage rationale between SFR and security objectives is provided in the [PP], section 6.3.1. And the SFR dependency is provided in the [PP], section 6.3.2.

#### 7.4. Security Assurance Requirement Rationale

The EAL4 was chosen to permit a developer to gain maximum assurance from positive security engineering based on good commercial development practices which, though rigorous, do not require substantial specialist knowledge, skills, and other resources. EAL4 is the highest level at which it is likely to be economically feasible to retrofit to an existing product line. EAL4 is applicable in those circumstances where developers or users require a moderate to high level of independently assured security in conventional commodity TOEs and are prepared to incur sensitive security specific engineering costs.

The selection of the component ALC\_DVS.2 provides a higher assurance of the security of the MRTD's development and manufacturing especially for the secure handling of the MRTD's material.

The selection of the component AVA\_VAN.5 provides a higher assurance of the security by vulnerability analysis to assess the resistance to penetration attacks performed by an attacker possessing a high attack potential. This vulnerability analysis is necessary to fulfill the security objectives **OT.Sens\_Data\_Conf** and **OT.Chip\_Auth\_Proof**.

The component ALC\_DVS.2 augmented to EAL4 has no dependencies to other security requirements.

The component AVA\_VAN.5 has the following dependencies:

- ADV ARC.1 Security architecture description
- ADV\_FSP.2 Security-enforcing functional specification
- ADV TDS.3 Basic modular design
- ADV IMP.1 Implementation representation of the TSF
- AGD OPE.1 Operational user guidance
- AGD\_PRE.1 Preparative procedures

All of these are met or exceeded in the EAL4 assurance package.

#### FPT TST.1 TSF testing

The JCOP platform performs self tests at the conditions during initial start-up at each power on.

The integrity of TSF data such as keys are checked automatically whenever they are accessed, authorized users can verify the integrity of TSF data by means of Status Word.

#### FPT\_PHP.3 Resistance to physical attack



The JCOP platform resists physical manipulation and physical probing to the JCOP platform by responding (resetting) automatically such that the JCOP's SFRs are always enforced.
